THE FACULTY OF TRADITIONAL CHINESE MEDICINE

ADMISSION REQUIREMENT:

- A) High school Diploma (or equivalent) OR over 19 years of age
- B) English Language Proficiency (For applicants whose first language is not English)
 Applicants whose first language is not English must demonstrate English language proficiency by submitting one of the following:
 - Completion of Grade 10 English
 - Proof of a successful completion of a recognized Canadian post-secondary educational program
 in English requiring at least two full years of academic study
 - IELTS: Minimum score of 5.0
 - TOEFL: Minimum score of IBT 45 or CBT 180
 - TOEIC: Minimum score of 600
 - Completion of Central College's ESL Program Level 4 or equivalent

CTCMA REQUIREMENT:

- Total 1900 hours minimum in 3 academic years including 450 hours of clinical instruction (Schedule E)
- 2 years of university education with 60 credits in liberal arts or sciences from accredited university or College (or Equivalent) for Canadian national registration exams and CTCMA registration.

- 4. ORIENTAL TUI-NA MASSAGE DIPLOMA PROGRAM

INTRODUCTION

Tui-Na is an ancient form of massage that has been practiced for more than 4,000 years. It is performed by moving and stimulating the flow of Qi-energy and blood flow in the body to help address imbalances and disharmonies in the body. Tui-Na massage includes the use of hand techniques to massage the soft tissue (muscle and tendon) of the body, acupressure techniques to directly affect the flow of Qi, and manipulation techniques to realign the musculoskeletal and ligamentous relationships. Tui-Na massage is also often used together with other practices, such as acupuncture and fire cupping, to increase its effectiveness.
